Most full-time students complete the required curriculum in the sequence listed below. Students who enter during the summer take only two courses that first summer term.

## PART-TIME REQUIRED CURRICULUM

Part-time students complete the required curriculum over five semesters, including one summer. Over the first five semesters, part-time students take 18 of 36 credit hours at the Tampa Law Center. The remaining credits are taken at the main College of Law campus in Gulfport.

## FINAL TWO YEARS — PART-TIME

During their last two years, part-time students are free to take electives and to complete the graduation area requirements. Students may select courses from throughout the curriculum, including morning, afternoon, evening or Saturday courses. Evening courses may have starting times between 5:00 and 7:40 p.m. Students have the flexibility to create schedules that meet their needs; for example, students can take Saturday classes or take classes on only two or three evenings.
