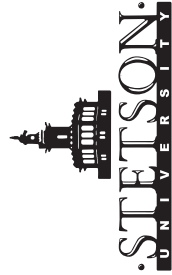

THE INTERNATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL MOOT COURT COMPETITION

Stetson University College of Law invites you to participate in the 10th Annual International Environmental Moot Court Competition. The **International Qualifying Rounds** will be at Stetson's Tampa Law Center on Oct. 26-27, with the **International Finals** on Stetson's main law campus in Gulfport/St. Petersburg on Oct. 28-29.

Regional qualifying rounds for North and South India, Australasia, and Ireland/United Kingdom will be held before the October competition. Teams from the Americas and elsewhere must compete in the International Qualifying Rounds. The top teams from each of the qualifying rounds will be invited to participate in the International Finals.

This competition provides an excellent opportunity for law students to explore issues of international environmental law in the context of a dispute before the International Court of Justice. The participants' memorials (briefs) will be evaluated by international environmental legal experts selected with the assistance of the ABA International Environmental Law Committees. Orals will be evaluated by local attorneys and judges with experience in international law, environmental law and appellate advocacy.

Each team in the International Qualifying Rounds will have the opportunity, after the problem is distributed, to select which side it will represent on the memorial on a first-come, first-served basis. Each team will then represent that same side through three preliminary oral argument rounds. The four best applicant teams and four best respondent teams will advance to the quarterfinal round. The two best applicant and two best respondent teams will then advance to the semi-final round. The top applicant and respondent team will advance to the final round. This realistic, client-based format is designed to enhance the participants' experience.

Invited judges for the International Finals championship round are **Dr. Noel S. Brown**, former director of the U.N. Environment Programme, North American Regional Office; **Ambassador Jamsheed Marker**, U.N. Under-Secretary-General and special adviser to the U.N. Secretary-General; and **William Thomas**, co-chair of the ABA International Environmental Law Committee, Section of International Law.

REGISTRATION

The rules and packet for the competition will be made available to participating schools. Each team may be composed of two or three full-time or part-time J.D. students, or the foreign equivalent. Space to the International Qualifying Rounds is limited to the first 16 teams (excluding teams eligible for other regional rounds) that register and pay the registration fee.

Any school that wishes to enter a second team may request to be placed on a waiting list. Second teams will be permitted to enter on a space-available basis as of August 15, 2005. The registration fee for any second team selected will be based on the date the team requested placement on the waiting list.

Award receptions will be held for both the International Qualifying Rounds and International Finals. A Distinguished Lecture and International Dinner will be held Oct. 28 and will be open to all.

TAMPA-ST. PETERSBURG

The Tampa-St. Petersburg area is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico. The average high temperature for late October is 80° F (27° C), and the area provides recreation including fishing, boating and golfing. Tampa offers the Busch Gardens theme park and animal preserve, Florida Aquarium with more than 4,300 Florida aquatic animals and plants, and the nightlife of historic Ybor City. St. Petersburg is home to the Florida International and Salvador Dali museums. Stetson is a short 90-minute drive from Orlando, home to Disney resorts, Universal Studios and Sea World. Each competition packet will include a visitors guide highlighting these and other recreational activities.

STETSON'S INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

Founded in 1900, Stetson is Florida's first law school. Located in the Tampa Bay area, Stetson is consistently ranked among the top law schools for trial advocacy by *U.S. News & World Report*.

Stetson offers an LL.M. degree in International Law and Business. Since the program's inception in 1998, lawyers from Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Ethiopia, France, Germany, Haiti, India, Jordan, Korea, Lebanon, Lithuania, Malaysia, Mauritius, the Netherlands, Nigeria, Norway, Panama, Poland, Russia, South Africa, Thailand, the United States, Venezuela and Vietnam have participated in the program.

Stetson will offer four summer abroad programs in Summer 2005. The International Dispute Resolution program in **Granada, Spain**, takes place May 31-June 24. The Scandinavian-Baltic Institute on Emerging Markets and Transitional Democracies in **Tallinn, Estonia**, will run from July 19-August 12. Our Summer Institute in International Law in **Buenos Aires, Argentina**, takes place July 19-August 13, and the Summer Institute in Public International Law in **The Hague, Netherlands, and Freiburg, Germany**, runs July 5-29.
